

Of or relating to a gene situated on the <u>X chromosome</u> or a <u>character (2)</u> or <u>trait</u> determined by such a gene. Most X-linked disorders and conditions, including <u>Duchenne muscular dystrophy</u>, haemophilia, and various forms of <u>colour-blindness</u>, are determined by <u>recessive genes</u> carried by females on an X chromosome but expressed predominantly in males who have only one X chromosome, preventing <u>complementation</u> from occurring. A female can inherit such a gene, but its effects are normally masked by a normal <u>dominant allele</u>, unless the female inherits the
