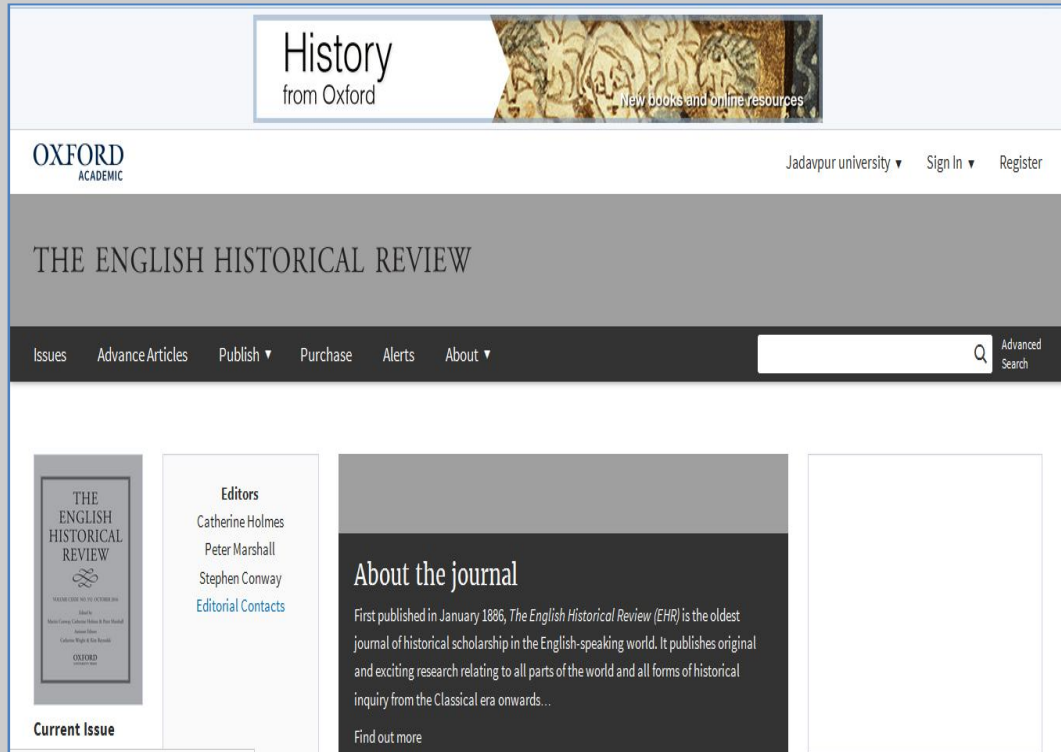

Brief History

The English Historical Review is a peer-reviewed, academic journal established in 1886 and published by Oxford University Press. The journal was established by John Dalberg-Acton, 1st Baron Acton, Regius professor of modern history at Cambridge, and

a fellow of All Souls College, Oxford. The first editor was Mandell Creighton. The current editors are Professor Martin Conway, Dr Catherine Holmes, and Professor Peter Marshall.

Scope and Coverage

It publishes original and exciting research relating to all parts of the world and all forms of historical inquiry from the Classical era onwards. It publishes articles on British, European, and world history. The EHR includes major Articles and Review Articles, and an unusually extensive range of Reviews of books published throughout the world in English and other languages. On an annual basis it compiles Notices of Records, Texts and Reference Works, and provides a summary of a wide range of periodical literature.

Kind of Information

Issues of the English Historical Review include Articles, 'Notes and Documents', and Debates on medieval and modern themes, as well as a large range of Reviews of books on history published throughout the world. A summary of international periodical literature published in the previous twelve months is also provided.

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The ring-fortress at Aggersborg, built c.970, was one of the most impressive monuments in Viking-Age Scandinavia. An earth and timber circular rampart, itself some nine metres across, and broken by four gateways at the cardinal points of the compass, enclosed an area 242 metres in diameter. An eight-metre wide berm and a ditch, four to five metres across and over a metre deep, surrounded the whole site. Inside, things were, if anything, more striking. From the gateways, axial timber-paved roads divided the fortress
